# WHAT IS COLLEGE APPLICATION MONTH?

College Application Month is part of a national initiative known as the American College Application Campaign. The American Council on Education started this initiative in 2005 with a single high school in North Carolina. Today, it reaches more than 250,000 schools in all 50 states. North Dakota was the final state to join the initiative in 2014.

The goal of College Application Month is to increase the number of first-generation and low-income students pursuing a college degree or other higher education credential. In addition to applying for college, College Application Month also helps students and their parents learn about the FAFSA and begin that process. With the changes to the FAFSA guidelines that were implemented in 2016, October is a perfect time of the year to conduct these events.

# History of American College Application Campaign


The American College Application Campaign (ACAC) began in 2005 with a single North Carolina high school. Its success spurred other schools to participate. Since 2008, the numbers participating in a College Application program has grown to more than 4,000 schools in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.


North Dakota was the final state to join the ACAC initiative. In 2014, North Dakota University System piloted the program at Magic City Campus in Minot. The following year, three more schools joined the effort: Carrington High School, Central Valley High School in Buxton and Watford City High School.

In 2016, North Dakota University System asked Bank of North Dakota (BND) to partner with them and lead the effort to expand the initiative statewide. The goal is to increase the number of North Dakota students applying to North Dakota colleges, with an emphasis on first-generation students and students from low-income families. Over the past six years, 17,303 students have taken advantage of the \$35 application fee that BND pays when a student attends a College Application Month event and applied to a North Dakota college or university!

### Benefits of College Application Month

In North Dakota, <u>Job Service's Labor Market Information projects</u> that entry level jobs in North Dakota across all education paths will increase through 2031, including those that require on the job training. Recent data also shows that North Dakota students have one of the highest high school graduation rates in the nation and below average rates for on-time college completion.





We believe this initiative will benefit students by helping them navigate the complex admissions and financial aid process early in the year and benefit the state by developing an educated workforce that is needed for our ever-changing economy.

# Implementing a College Application Month event

Each high school will identify a site coordinator, typically a guidance or career counselor or assistant principal, who will be responsible for implementing the program at your site. ACAC and BND has provided resources that can be customized to fit your school's event and the needs of your students.

College Application Month doesn't happen in a vacuum. Most schools are already implementing career exploration and college planning activities throughout the school year and we want this event to complement your efforts. Application events prove to be most successful when students are adaquately prepared to submit their college applications.

Every school's event will look different depending on the size of your senior class and how involved you want to get. Some schools plan events that take one day, some plan activities over an entire week or even incorporate college and career planning activities throughout an entire month. You may decide to incorporate elements of college planning in class lessons, have a door decorating contest, or have a college t-shirt day. The options are endless!

As with any event, success is often determined in the planning stages. In addition to the College Application Month activities, site coordinators will also want to consider what students will need to do to be ready to submit their college applications and how you want other teachers and school staff to be involved. If you want to include additional activities for students who's plans don't involve college, BND has some great ideas for you.

# Implementing a College Application Month event at your school only has three hard and fast rules:

- 1. Schedule a time during the regular school day that adheres with guidelines at your school for students to complete their applications.
- 2. Give all seniors the opportunity to participate.
- 3. Collect data as requested by the state coordinator.

### Some common questions from schools have been:

### 1. Do I need to host the event during the school day?

Yes. It is the best way to reach all seniors and to have maximum participation, especially with the demographic we are trying to reach: first-generation students and students from low-income families who may not have the knowledge about applying to college or the resources to do so at home.

### 2. What if my students aren't ready to apply, already applied, or aren't going to college?

"College" can mean any education or job training beyond a high school diploma. Review the Student Instructions resource for additional ideas for ways your students can participate, regardless of their postsecondary plans or where they are at in the process.

### 3. Do I need volunteers?

It depends! Small schools or schools that have participated for many years may be able to host an event with just the counselor or a small school team to assist students during the application days.

For schools that would like volunteers, BND is happy to recruit college admissions reps, Dollars for Scholars volunteers or even reps from your local bank or credit union to assist your students. Due to the high demand of volunteers on some days, we also may ask you to reach out to your contacts if our volunteer groups are unable to attend your event.

## Bank of North Dakota will provide:

- Every school will receive a code to pay for one \$35 application fee to any North Dakota college or university during the month of October.
- Digital volunteer resources that each school can use to create custom volunteer packets.
- Statewide media efforts, a press release and an article template which can be customized for your local area.

# **Site Coordinator Checklist**

Use this checklist as a guide as you implement a College Application Month event. It includes suggested activities, but can be customized to fit your specific event.

# **Site Coordinator Timeline**

Prior to school year
Register your school with the state coordinator
Establish a school team to assist with implementation; host a meeting
☐ Add the College Application Month event to your school's master calendar
Beginning of the school year
Meet with your school team to set a date and to get acquainted with the event
<ul> <li>Ensure students' technology needs are adequate; computer labs, laptops and internet connection</li> </ul>
Communicate to seniors and parents during any beginning of the school year about College Application Month
Communicate to seniors and parents during any beginning of the school about all of the fall college and career planning events
☐ Remind students to attend the fall college fair
☐ Place the event on the school's web page and social media sites such as Facebook
Watch for emails with the Site Coordinator Handbook and volunteer resources from the state coordinator
Encourage teachers to implement college preparedness activities in their classes
Confirm space and computers are reserved for the event and your school's technology
coordinator is ready to tackle any technology issues that may arise
2 Weeks prior to your event
Remind teachers, counselors and administrators of the event schedule and ensure all senior will have the opportunity to participate
☐ Remind parents about the event and supply them with <u>a list of items</u> their child will need to complete a college application
☐ Hang, email or share posters provided by BND in your school and in the community
☐ Use the <u>press release template</u> to submit an article to the local newspaper to celebrate your success
1 Week before the event
☐ Remind students the event is next week and supply them with <u>a list of items</u> they will
need to complete a college application
☐ Encourage staff and underclassmen to participate
☐ Use the provided press release to alert local media about the event
☐ Place a reminder on your school's web page and social media sites (i.e., Facebook, Twitter)

Week of the event
☐ Make sure that handouts and other documents needed are printed or easily available virtually
☐ Prepare any documents needed for your students: transcripts, transcript request forms,
application code information and student instructions
Day of the College Application Month event
lacktriangle Ensure students apply to at least one college or participate in alternative activities if they
are being held
Contact the state coordinator directly if there is a large-scale issue
☐ If students have extra time, encourage them to update or create their North Dakota Dollars for
Scholars scholarship profile. Scholarships open in January!
☐ Post on social media about your event
☐ Have the state coordinator's contact information on hand
Week after the event
Submit any requested data to your state coordinator
☐ Follow up with your school team to share your success
☐ Commit to host next year!
